GROUP ON EARTH OBSERVATIONS (GEO) MEETINGS IN BEIJING, CHINA

As a Participating Organization the IUGS has been invited to attend the Seventh Plenary Session of the Group on Earth Observations (GEO-VII) which will take place on 3-4 November 2010 at the China National Convention Centre in Beijing. The Government of the People's Republic of China is also inviting Ministers from the GEO's 80 Member Governments and the European Commission, together with the heads of GEO's 58 Participating Organizations, to a Ministerial Summit in Beijing on 5 November 2010 immediately following the GEO-VII. The Beijing Ministerial Summit will offer an opportunity to engage with other global leaders and to shape the international strategy for Earth observation over the next five years.

One of the key issues to be considered in Beijing, will be to encourage Ministers to pledge full and open access to specific sets of previously hard-to-find national data, and particularly in-situ data which are critical for managing water and food supplies and other natural resources. They will be invited to endorse the Implementation Guidelines and Action Plan for The Global Earth Observation System of Systems (GEOSS) Data Sharing Principles, to advocate for additional resources for capacity building, and for national Earth observation programs and applications. They will review the progress achieved by GEOSS and plan for its future, and discuss how GEOSS can support the international response to the United Nation's Millennium Development Goals and other priority issues facing the global community. UN LAUNCHES DECADE-LONG EFFORTS TO TACKLE DESERTIFICATION

The United Nations has launched The Decade for Deserts and the Fight against Desertification (2010-2020), an 11-year long effort to raise awareness and action to improve the protection and management of the world's drylands, home to a third of the world's population and which face serious economic and environmental threats. In a statement announcing the launch UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon said "Continued land degradation, whether from climate change, unsustainable agriculture or poor management of water resources, is a threat to food security, leading to starvation among the most acutely affected communities and robbing the world of productive land.

As we begin the Decade on Deserts and the Fight against Desertification, let us pledge to intensify our efforts to nurture the land we need for achieving the Millennium Development Goals and guaranteeing human well-being, he added.

On a global scale, desertification defined as "land degradation in drylands" affects 3.6 billion hectares, which accounts for 25 percent of the Earth's terrestrial land mass. It threatens the livelihoods of more than 1 billion people in some 100 countries. Against this backdrop, member states of the United Nations addressed growing desertification and land degradation by adopting a resolution to dedicate the next decade to combating desertification and improving the protection and management of the world's drylands in 2007.

The global launch took place in Fortaleza, Brazil, in the State of Ceara, Brazil's semi-arid Region, during the Second International Conference on Climate, Sustainability and Development in Semi-arid Regions. Also on the same day the regional launch for Africa was held in Nairobi, Kenya, at the headquarters of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and in partnership with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). Other regional launches are scheduled to take place in New York, in September, for the North American Region, in the Republic of Korea in October, for the Asian Region, and in November for the European region. AGI WELCOMES KARST WATERS INSTITUTE AS 47TH MEMBER SOCIETY

The Karst Waters Institute (KWI) has joined the American Geological Institute (AGI) as the Federation's 47th Member Society. The KWI is a non-profit institution whose mission is to improve the fundamental understanding of karst water systems through sound scientific research and education of professionals and the public. KWI uses a multi-disciplinary approach to research karst aquifers and terrains.

More than 25 percent of the world's population either lives on or obtains its water from karst aquifers. In the United States, 20 percent of the land surface is karst, predominately in Florida, Texas, Missouri, and the Appalachian Mountains region. Nearly 40 percent of all groundwater used for drinking comes from karst aquifers. Common geological characteristics of karst regions include caves and caverns, unpredictable but sometimes prolific water supply, ground subsidence, sinkhole collapse, and groundwater contamination problems. By joining AGI, Karst Waters Institute will increase awareness within the geoscience community and with the general public of the geological and ecological importance of karst terrains and aquifers.
