NEWS FROM THE IUGS OFFICE

Message from the IUGS' President and Secretary General:

The first five months of the new IUGS Executive Committee (EC) have proved to be interesting and productive. The EC is largely new, particularly since the unfortunate recent resignation of Past-President Alberto Riccardi for personal reasons; only two ongoing Councillors, Wesley Hill and Sampat Tandon, provide continuity. China has increased its involvement, providing the Treasurer, Dong Shuwen, and taking over the Secretariat function from the USGS' Richard Calnan and Nancy Zeigler (who are thanked most sincerely for their effective efforts over the term of the last EC). Anne Dehls, former IUGS Secretariat, has agreed to work part time with the new Secretariat, assisting Chinese colleagues Li Zhijan, Wang Wei, Chen Zhu and Li Wei in the new office.

Amongst the actions to date are: Councillor Hassina Mouri took over production of the e-Bulletin; the first meeting of the Bureau (President Roland Oberhaensli, Treasurer Dong Shuwen and Secretary General Ian Lambert) was held in Beijing, in association with opening the new Secretariat; reviews were conducted of the joint IUGS-UNESCO programs, International Geoscience Program (IGCP) and Geoscience Applications of Remote Sensing (GARS), involving Vice Presidents Yildirim Dilek and Marko Komac; President Oberhaensli held discussions with UNESCO on future collaboration, including on Global Geoparks; Wesley Hill represented IUGS at a meeting of the European Geoparks Network and the Global Geoparks Bureau meeting in Portugal; the new Publications Committee was appointed, chaired by Brian Marker; initial scoping was conducted by Ian Lambert and Dong Shuwen for a new initiative on mineral resources for future generations; initial planning was conducted by Councillor Yujiro Ogawa for a joint IUGS-Geological Society of Japan international workshop on tsunami; Brian Marker agreed to Chair the Publications Committee, which will also include Vice President Yildirim Dilek and webmaster Peter Bobrowsky; an electronic Reference Manual was prepared for the EC; approval was given for the International Commission for Stratigraphy's recommended the type section for the Santonian Stage; IUGS renewed its agreement with OneGeology; the Netherlands has rejoined IUGS, with TNO as the Adhering Organisation; President Roland Oberhaensli represented IUGS at the 24th colloquium on African geology that was held with the 14th conference of the Geology Society of Africa and the 40th anniversary of GSAf; organisation of the first annual meeting of the new EC (Paris 19-22 February) was progressed; and planning commenced for a significant IUGS presence at the GSA Annual Assembly in Denver in late October, including interactions with Affiliate Members.

Resignation of Professor Alberto C Riccardi (IUGS Past President):

Alberto Riccardi provided strong and focussed leadership for the IUGS as President from 2008-12. As Past President Alberto was a member of the IUGS' Executive and Nominating Committees. He announced his resignation from these IUGS positions in mid January for personal reasons. As President, Alberto oversaw the move of the editorial office for the IUGS journal EPISODES from China to India. He negotiated the move of the Permanent Secretariat from Norway temporarily to the USA, and before his term ended he signed the agreement under which China agreed to host a larger Secretariat office until 2020. He played an influential role in the revision of the IUGS and IGC Statutes and Bylaws, which were approved at the 34th IGC in Brisbane. He worked hard to maintain a strong partnership with UNESCO, and arranged Ad hoc Reviews of several IUGS funded activities. The IUGS Executive Committee expresses its thanks to Alberto Riccardi.

> The Relocated IUGS Permanent Secretariat Opens in Beijing:

An unveiling ceremony was held in Beijing on December 11th, 2012 to mark the opening of the IUGS Permanent Secretariat, which has been relocated to China after it was hosted in USGS in 2010-2012 and the Geological Survey of Norway in 1993-2009. The new Secretariat started operation since 1st December 2012.

Mr. Xu Shaoshi, Minister of Land and Resources of China and President of Geological Society of China, and IUGS President Prof. Roland Oberhänsli, jointly unveiled the plaque of the Secretariat. Also present at the unveiling ceremony were IUGS Secretary General Dr. Ian Lambert, Treasurer Prof. Dong Shuwen, Past IUGS President Prof. Zhang Hongren (2004-2008), Past Vice President Prof. Liu Dunyi (1992-2000) and Secretariat Director Mr. Li Zhijian.

The relocated IUGS Permanent Secretariat is hosted within the premises of the Chinese Academy of Geological Sciences (CAGS) with a commitment of 8 years in accordance with the MOU between the Ministry of Land and Resources of China and the International Union of Geological Sciences signed during the 34th IGC in Brisbane, Australia on August 6th, 2012.

The Bureau members, Prof. Roland Oberhänsli, Dr. Ian Lambert and Prof. Dong Shuwen, held the IUGS Bureau meeting on December 10-12, 2012 during their stay in Beijing.

• South Africa: a Future Potential Destination for Earth Science Meetings of International Significance

A number of important earth science meetings of international interest and importance are scheduled in South Africa this year, and over the next few years. Travel to South Africa is straightforward (and in a European time zone), and conferencing facilities and organization are world class. Meetings can generally be staged in South Africa at lower costs to delegates than in Europe or North America.

The **International Mineralogical Association** 21st general meeting (**IMA 2014** – Delving Deeper: Minerals as Mines of Information) will be staged in Johannesburg from 1 – 5 September 2014. Session theme calls were sent out and 40 proposals have been accepted so far. Further submissions for proposals are encouraged. During this event, a variety of field trips, as well as day visits to mineralogical/geochemical laboratories will be offered. This will be the key international mineralogical event of 2014, and should be attended by anyone involved in mineralogy and related aspects. In 2016, the 35th International Geological Congress will be staged in Cape Town, from August 27 through September 4. In 2012, Table Mountain overlooking Cape Town was declared one of the New 7 Wonders of Nature, and Cape Town itself is one of the world's foremost business tourism destinations. If this is not reason enough to come to South Africa, there will be an extensive field trip program throughout Africa. In 2013, there are so far **four** meetings scheduled, which will also be of international interest:

From July 3 to 5, 2013, the Geological Society of South African (GSSA) will stage GeoForum 2013: Mineralization and Geosciences in Africa. The African continent has become a key target for international exploration, and the objective is to highlight some of the activity as well as key academic research focused on African resources. The meeting will be held in Turbine Hall in the Newtown district of Johannesburg, in the heart of the historic mining centre.

For those interested in geoheritage and geotourism, the second South African Geoheritage meeting will take place on the 8-11 September 2013 and will be staged in the historic Western Cape town of Oudtshoorn, easily accessible from Cape Town or George in the Western Cape. Field excursions will highlight the geology and geomorphology of the Cape Fold Belt; the meeting will address various aspects of geoheritage in South Africa and globally, with special interest on the Klein Karoo. For those who are in the field of "Medical Geology" and interested in geo-health issues in Africa, a 1st meeting in this field will be organised at the University of Johannesburg on 26th - 28th September 2013. The meeting will consist of 2 days short course to be presented by Prof Jose Centeno (USA) and collaborators, followed by 1 day oral and poster presentations, with a possibility of a 1day excursion.
